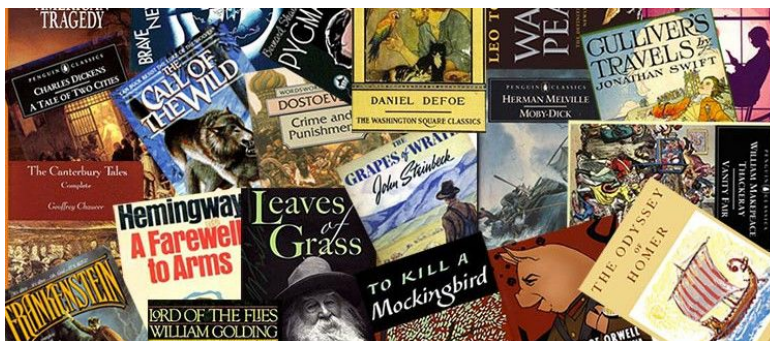


AP Literature & Composition

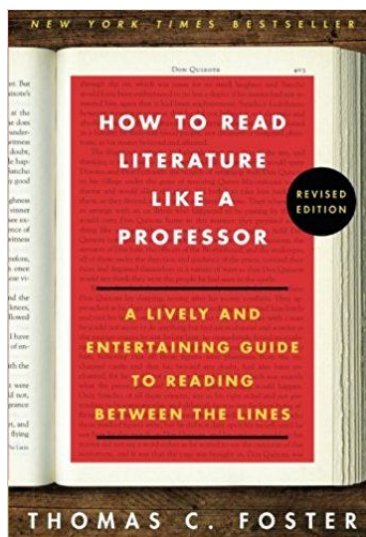
When you read a novel, do you find yourself challenging an author's interpretation of a character or finding symbolic meaning in minute details? This is the crux of AP Literature: deep analysis of a text to see how an author composes a message. To that end, the summer tasks here are designed to help you get a taste of what is expected and for me to gauge your strengths and weaknesses. You'll be amazed at what you accomplish!



PART I: The following must be turned in August 19, 2019 as you enter the classroom!

ASSIGNMENT:

1. Print or purchase *How to Read Literature Like a Professor* by Thomas C. Foster [Available for purchase on Amazon or for download at this link: <https://goo.gl/Rsy8cu>]**Note: If you print it, you MUST put it in a separate binder.



2. Read the entire book, including the introduction and mark the book according to these guidelines:
 - o Write a (!) for any new insights you've gained.
 - o Write a (?) for any questions you may still have.
 - o **Underline** main ideas and **highlight** key words (at least 3-5 per page).
 - o **Summarize** major points at the bottom of each page (2-3 sentences).

PART II: The following must be emailed to me by August 12, 2019 at kyounus@ifsvp.org.

1. Read one of the following books:
 - *Wuthering Heights* by Emily Brontë
 - *The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn* by Mark Twain
 - *Antigone* by Sophocles
 - *The Great Gatsby* by F. Scott Fitzgerald
 - *A Raisin in the Sun* by Lorraine Hansberry
 - *The Things They Carried* by Tim O'Brien
 - *The Stranger* by Albert Camus
2. Using evidence from the story, write a 2-3 page essay (12-point font, double-spaced with 1" margins) answering the question, "What do you think the author's opinion is of individualism and conforming to societal norms?" ****Note:** You will receive a participation grade, provided you cite **at least 10-12** proofs from the story to support your answer. A maximum of 15% of your grade will be deducted for errors in spelling, mechanics or usage.
